So, after living in Kalamazoo, Michigan for 18 years, the

Michigan native and his wife, Lee, drove West across the

U.S. to start again in Phoenix. The couple was familiar with the Southwestern desert as Gordon had apprenticed in

Tucson and in Phoenix, Arizona.

Genton Ringers opened his office in Phoeeix with a simple business plan. Ironically, Ropers' Arizona career began in Santa Fe, New Mexico when, in 1993, he was saled to design a stade for aristst Fera and Fera Service of the Comment of the Comment of the Comment of the Desert Mountain, an exclusive golf community in North Scottsdain. The Desert Mountain residence won an AIA award in 1991 and was also named Arlsona Home of the Year. Publication put Repert work in front of an appreciative audience who prices bold geometric architecture. Other Arlsona Home of the Year awards followed. Within a few years, Gordon Rogers' yellow mustang con-

vertible, circa 1973, was a familiar sight in exclusive North Scottsdale communities.
